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## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Fire Commissioners  
City of Lambertville Fire District No.1  
Lambertville, New Jersey

### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1, in the County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

### Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1, in the County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, as of December 31, 2014, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with



accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 9 and 21 through 22, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 basic financial statements. The introductory section and other supplementary information are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The other supplementary information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The introductory section has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 30, 2015, on our consideration of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

For the Year Ended December 31, 2014

Unaudited

The discussion and analysis of the City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's financial performance provides an overall review of the District's financial activities for the year ended December 31, 2014. The intent of the discussion and analysis is to look at the District's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the basic financial statements and notes to enhance their understanding of the District's financial performance.

The 2013 financial data is shown for comparative purposes only. The amounts were obtained from the financial statements audited by Lawson, Rescino, Schibell & Associates, P.C. on which they expressed an unqualified opinion in their report dated October 9, 2014. They have not performed auditing procedures on the financial statements since that date.

### **Financial Highlights**

Key financial highlights for 2014 are as follows:

Total assets were \$2,413,371 and total liabilities were \$44,911 resulting in a net position of \$2,368,460 at December 31, 2014.

The District's unrestricted net position was \$492,497 at December 31, 2014.

General revenues accounted for \$909,147 or 100% of all revenues.

Per generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) basis, the District had \$692,360 in expenses including \$120,523 of depreciation for 2014 and general revenues (primarily taxes) of \$909,147, resulting in a change in net position of \$216,787.

Per Non-GAAP budgetary basis, the District had \$1,771,837 in expenditures and capital asset outlays and \$909,147 of actual revenue which resulted in an \$862,690 deficit of revenues over expenditures. The District utilized \$791,094 of the \$791,094 designated surplus of restricted funds noted in the 2014 budget and \$71,596 of the \$120,963 designated surplus of unrestricted funds noted in the 2014 budget to cover the expenditures and purchase of the new fire truck in 2014.

### **Using this Annual Report**

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements and notes to those financial statements. These statements are organized so the reader can understand City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 as a financial whole, an entire operating entity. The statements then proceed to provide an increasingly detailed look at specific financial activities.

This annual report consists of the following three parts: management's discussion and analysis (this section), the basic financial statements, and required supplementary information.

## Required Financial Statements

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, any special purpose government entity that has only one major fund (not including fiduciary funds) may show the government-wide and fund financial statements all as part of the basic financial statements. Since the District only has governmental funds the District-wide and fund financial statements are combined in the basic financial statements. The financial statements of the District report information utilizing the full accrual basis of accounting. The financial statements conform to accounting principles which are generally accepted in the United States of America. The Statement of Net Position and Governmental Funds Balance Sheet includes information on the District's assets and liabilities and provides information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to District creditors (liabilities). The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Net Position and Governmental Fund Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances identify the District's revenues and expenses for the year ended December 31, 2014.

## Financial Analysis of the District

The Statement of Net Position and Governmental Funds Balance Sheet and the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Net Position and Governmental Fund Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances provide an indication of the District's financial condition. The District's net position reflects the difference between assets and liabilities. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

## Net Position

A summary of the District's Statement of Net Position is presented below.

As Table 1 indicates, total assets decreased by \$231,656 from \$2,645,027 to \$2,413,371 during the year ended December 31, 2014. This is comprised of a decrease of \$130,849 in cash and cash equivalents, a decrease in prepaid insurance of \$19,317, a decrease in advances of \$900,000 and an increase in capital assets, net of depreciation of \$818,510. The net increase in capital assets is due to posting 2014 depreciation of \$120,523, purchasing the new fire truck for \$1,200,000 and selling two old fire trucks with a net book value of \$260,967. Total liabilities reflect a decrease of \$177,763. This includes a decrease of \$177,763 in accounts payable and accrued expenses at year end.

Table 1 also indicates that total net position decreased \$53,893 from \$2,422,353 in 2013 to \$2,368,460 in 2014. This decrease is due to \$216,787 of revenues exceeding expenses for 2014, adjusting net position for prior period adjustments of \$9,713 and writing off the net book value of \$260,967 for two fire trucks that were sold in 2014. In addition, net position invested in capital assets, net of related debt, increased by \$818,510 (see explanation above.) There was a decrease of \$791,094 in the capital projects reserves. The decrease to capital projects reserves of \$791,094 was due utilizing the \$791,094 of the capital reserves to make purchase the new fire truck.

The Statement of Activities identifies the various revenue and expense items which affect the change in net position. Table 2 indicates that the District's total revenues decreased by \$15,873. The decrease in revenue was primarily due to a decrease in other revenues. The total expenses increased by \$97,735. The majority of the change was primarily due to an increase in payroll and payroll taxes and fringe benefits and an increase in firefighting supplies and repairs.

**Governmental Activities**

The unique nature of property taxes in New Jersey creates the legal requirements to annually seek voter approval for the District operations. Property taxes made up 57.7% of revenues for governmental activities for City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 for 2014 and 55.6% in 2013. The

District's total revenues were \$909,147 for the year ended December 31, 2014 and \$925,020 for the year ended December 31, 2013. In 2014, the sale of equipment accounted for 41.5% of revenue, the state grant accounted for .3%, investment income for .3% and other income for .2%. In 2013, the sale of equipment accounted for 39.7% of revenue, other income for 4% and investment income for .7%.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Net Position shows the cost of program services and the charges for services and grants offsetting those services.

Administration includes expenses associated with administrative and financial supervision of the District.

Cost of Operations and Maintenance involve keeping equipment in an effective working condition.

**The District's Funds**

All governmental funds (i.e., general fund and capital projects fund) are accounted for using the modified-accrual basis of accounting. Total revenues were \$909,147 and expenditures were \$692,360. The change in fund balance for the year in the general fund was a decrease of \$53,893 which includes a decrease in the capital projects fund of \$791,094, an increase in unrestricted fund balance of \$81,309 and an increase in fund balance invested in capital assets, net of related debt of \$818,510.

As demonstrated by the various statements and schedules included in the financial section of this report, the District continues to meet its responsibility for sound financial management. The following schedule presents a summary of the revenues of the General Fund for the year ended December 31, 2014, and the amount of increases and decreases in relation to prior year revenues.

**Capital Assets**

At the end of the year 2014, the District had \$1,875,963 invested in capital assets net of depreciation. Table 5 shows 2014 balances compared to 2013.

In 2014, capital assets, net of depreciation increased by \$818,510. The net increase in capital assets was due to booking 2014 depreciation of \$120,523, purchasing a new aerial ladder fire truck for \$1,200,000 and writing off two fire trucks with a net book value of \$260,967 that were sold in 2014.

## **Economic Factors**

For the 2014 year, the City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 was able to sustain its budget through the district tax levy, other sources of revenue and utilization of its unrestricted and restricted fund balance. Approximately 57.7% of total revenue is from the local tax levy, while the remaining 42.3% was from other sources. The tax rate levy per \$100 of property valuation increased from \$.0718 in 2013 to \$.0733 in 2014.

The Board of Fire Commissioners adopted the 2015 budget on January 20, 2015. On February 21, 2015 the budget was approved by the voters. The final budget was approved by the State of New Jersey, Local Finance Board, in March 2015.

## **For the Future**

City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 is presently in good financial condition. The District is proud of its community support.

In conclusion, City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 has committed itself to financial excellence for many years. In addition, the District's system for financial planning, budgeting, and internal financial controls are well regarded. The District plans to continue its sound fiscal management to meet the challenge of the future.

### **NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The financial statements of the City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 (the "District") have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below.

#### Reporting Entity

City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 is a political subdivision of the City of Lambertville, County of Hunterdon in the State of New Jersey. The District was established to function as a special service district through the adoption of a city ordinance, to provide fire prevention and suppression services to the residents of Lambertville. The District functions independently through a Board of Fire Commissioners. The board is comprised of five members elected to three-year terms. The board is responsible for the fiscal control of the District. The annual Fire District election is held the third Saturday of February.

The fire district is governed by N.J.S.A. 40A:14-70 et al. and is organized as a taxing authority charged with the responsibility of providing the resources necessary to provide firefighting services to the residents within its territory. The Fire District has three volunteer fire companies within its jurisdiction, Union Fire Co. #1, Hibernia Fire Co. #2, and the Fleetwing Fire Co. #3, which provide a manpower pool of volunteers.

In accordance with the criterion as set forth in Section 2100 of the GASB *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards*, the financial statements must present the District (the primary government) and its component units. Component units are legally separate entities for which the District (the primary entity) is financially accountable. Financial accountability is defined as the ability to appoint a voting majority of the organization's governing body and either (1) the District's ability to impose its will over the organization or (2) the potential that the organization will provide a financial benefit to, or impose a financial burden on, the District. Pursuant to this criterion, no component units were identified for inclusion in the accompanying financial statements.

#### Basic Financial Statements – Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The District's basic financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in net position) combine both government-wide (reporting the District as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the District's major funds) and report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government.

The statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in net position demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function are offset by revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include 1) charges to residents or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function.

Basic Financial Statements – Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements (continued)

Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported as general revenues.

Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the basic financial statements.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental funds financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified-accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. The District in general considers revenues available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements have been met. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

For the governmental funds financial statements, the District considers all revenues susceptible to accrual and recognizes revenue if the accrual criteria are met. Expenditure-driven grants are recognized as revenue when the qualifying expenditures have been incurred and all other eligibility requirements have been met and are recorded at the time of receipt or earlier, if the susceptible to accrual criteria are met.

The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purpose and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions. The minimum number of funds is maintained consistent with legal and managerial requirements.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all the financial resources and the legally authorized activities of the District except those required to be accounted for in other specialized funds.

#### Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation(continued)

The Capital Projects Fund is used to account for the financial resources for the acquisition of capital assets or the construction of major capital facilities within the District. The financial resources are derived from the issuance of debt or by reservation of fund balance that are specifically authorized by the voters as a separate question on the ballot either during the annual election or at a special election.

#### Encumbrances

Under encumbrance accounting purchase orders, contracts and other commitments for the expenditure of resources are recorded to reserve a portion of the applicable appropriation. Open encumbrances in governmental funds are reported as reservations of fund balances at fiscal year end as they do not constitute expenditures of liabilities but rather commitments related to unperformed contracts for goods and services.

#### Revenues and Expenditures

Revenues are recorded when they are determined to be both available and measurable. Generally, fees and other non-tax revenues are recognized when received. Grants from other governments are recognized when qualifying expenditures are incurred. Expenditures are recorded when the related liability is incurred, if measurable, except for unmatured interest on general long-term debt, which is recognized when due.

#### Prepaid Expenses

If any, prepaid expenses recorded on the district-wide financial statements represent payments to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond December 31, 2014.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for governmental units requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

#### Income Taxes

As a public body, the District is exempt from both federal and state taxes existing under statute.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash used for the day-to-day operations of the Fire District is in a non-interest bearing checking account and interest bearing savings accounts.

For presentation in the financial statements, investments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the District are considered to be cash equivalents. Investments with a maturity of more than three months, if any, are reported as investments.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents(continued)

New Jersey fire districts are limited as to the types of investments and types of financial institutions they may invest in. New Jersey statutes provide a list of permissible investments that may be purchased by New Jersey fire districts.

#### Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include fire trucks, vehicles and equipment, and radio equipment, generally result from expenditures in the governmental funds. These assets are reported on the government-wide statement of net position.

Generally, the District capitalizes assets with an individual cost of \$5,000 or more and a useful life greater than one year. All capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. The District does not possess any infrastructure. Improvements are capitalized; the cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the asset's life are not.

Depreciation has been provided over estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Radio equipment	5 - 7 years
Fire trucks	20 years
Vehicles and equipment	5 - 10 years

#### Employee Benefits

Vacation, sick pay and other employee benefits are recorded as expenditures when paid except for other post employment benefits noted in Note 10.

#### Budget and Budgetary Accounting

The District must adopt an annual budget in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:14-78.1 et. al. The fire commissioners must introduce and approve the annual budget no later than sixty days prior to the annual election. Upon introduction, the commissioners fix the time and place for a public hearing on the budget and must advertise the time and place at least ten days prior to the hearing in a newspaper having substantial circulation in the District. The public hearing must not be held less than twenty-eight days after the date the budget was introduced. After the hearing has been held, the fire commissioners may, by majority vote, adopt the budget.

Amendments may be made to the District budget in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:14-78.3.

#### Budget and Budgetary Accounting (continued)

Subsequent to the adoption of the District budget, the amount of money to be raised by taxation in support of the District budget must appear on the ballot for the annual election for approval of the legal voters.

Fire districts have a prescribed budgetary basis to demonstrate legal compliance. However, budgets are adopted on principally the same basis of accounting utilized for the preparation of the District's financial statements.

#### Fire District Taxes

Upon the proper certification to the assessor of the municipality in which the District is located, the assessor shall assess the amount of taxes to be raised in support of the District's budget in the same manner as all other municipal taxes. The collector or treasurer of the municipality then pays the assessed taxes in four equal installments to the treasurer or custodian of funds of the District.

### NOTE 2 – CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS AND CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The District has adopted a cash management plan that requires it to deposit public funds in public depositories protected from loss under the provisions of the Government Unit Deposit Protection Act ("GUDPA"). GUDPA was enacted in 1970 to protect Governmental Units from a loss of funds on deposit with a failed banking institution in New Jersey.

N.J.S.A. 17:9-41 et. Seq. establishes the requirements for security of deposits of governmental units. The statute requires that no governmental unit shall deposit public funds in a public depository unless such funds are secured in accordance with the Act. Public depositories include Savings and Loan institutions, banks (both state and national banks) and savings banks the deposits of which are federally insured. All public depositories must pledge collateral, having a market value at least equal to five percent of the average daily balance of collected public funds, to secure the deposits of Governmental Units. If a public depository fails, the collateral it has pledged, plus the collateral of all other public depositories, is available to pay the full amount of their deposits to the Governmental Units.

#### Bank deposits

All bank deposits are classified as to credit risk by the three categories. **Category 1** consists of bank deposits insured or collateralized with securities held by the District or in the District's name by its agent. **Category 2** consists of bank deposits collateralized with securities held by pledging public depository's trust department or agent in the District's name. **Category 3** includes uncollateralized deposits including any deposits that are collateralized with securities held by the pledging public depository or by its trust department or agent but not in the District's name. At December 31, 2014, the District's deposits of \$537,408 are classified as Category 1 deposits.

Depreciation expense of \$120,523 was charged to governmental activities as part of its cost of operations in 2014. In 2014, the District purchased a new Pierce Velocity 100' Aerial Ladder truck for \$1,200,000. It utilized \$791,094 of the \$791,094 of restricted reserves and \$377,750 from the sale of two old fire trucks to purchase the vehicle. The two trucks sold had a net book value of \$229,529 which was taken off of the books at the time of the sales. The District also wrote-off \$65,760 of fully depreciated and old equipment that was no longer working or had been scrapped prior to 2014.

**NOTE 4 – ACCRUED EXPENSES**

Accrued expenses include costs for payroll and related payroll taxes and other operating expenses that were incurred for the year ended December 31, 2014 but were not paid by that date.

**NOTE 5 – UNRESTRICTED NET POSITION**

Unrestricted net position at December 31, 2014 totaled \$492,497. Of that amount, \$68,500 is anticipated to be utilized in the 2015 budget as designated surplus.

**NOTE 6 – RENT FOR HOUSING APPARATUS**

The District is comprised of three fire volunteer fire companies. The District owns all fire apparatus, except for one restored fire truck, which is owned by the Union Fire Company. The District also owns all equipment on the vehicles and the firemen's attire. The buildings which house the fire apparatus are owned by the respective fire companies. The District paid rent to the firehouses totaling \$54,900 for the year ended December 31, 2014.

**NOTE 7 – NJ SUPPLEMENTAL FIRE SERVICES PROGRAM GRANT**

New Jersey Basic Entitlement Grant

Annually, the Supplemental Fire Services Program (SFSP) awards a grant to the Fire District for volunteer fire services. By acceptance of the grant, the Fire District agrees to all obligations and responsibilities pursuant to the SFSP as provided in Ch. 295, P.L., 1985.

The funds are utilized for the purchase of items as defined in compliance with state statutes. The grant was budgeted for \$1,249 for the year ended December 31, 2014. The District received and expended \$2,498 for the year ended December 31, 2014.

**NOTE 8 – PENSION RETIREMENT SYSTEMS**

Description of Pension Retirement Systems

Employees of the District, who are eligible for pension coverage, are covered by the Public Employees' Retirement System or the Police and Firemen's Retirement System of New Jersey, both cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans, which have been established by state statute and administered by the New Jersey Division of Pension and Benefits (Division). According to the State of New Jersey Administrative Code, all obligations of both Systems will be assumed by the State of New Jersey should the System's terminate. The Division issues a publicly available financial report that includes the financial statements and required supplementary information for the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) and the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS). These reports may be obtained by writing to the Division of Pension and Benefits, P.O. Box 295, Trenton, NJ, 08625 or contacting the Division through the internet at [www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions](http://www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions).

The plans do not maintain separate records for each reporting unit and, accordingly, the actuarial data for the District is not available. The employee's portion is deducted weekly from his/her paycheck and is paid to the state monthly. The organization contributes to the pension fund and receives a statement of liability from the State of New Jersey on an annual basis. The annual appropriation for 2014 from the State of New Jersey for PERS only was \$1,747.

The employees of the City of Lambertville Fire District No. 1 are not covered by any other postemployment pension benefit, but the firefighters are provided with paid time off which varies based on their length of service to the fire district.

**NOTE 9 – STATEMENT OF NET POSITION – ADJUSTMENTS**

In order to present the statement of net position in accordance with GASB 34, the District needed to make certain adjustments to the general fund balance sheet. The capital assets previously reported in the fixed asset group of accounts, net of accumulated depreciation of \$1,875,963 had to be posted to the general fund. Also, the ending fund balances had to be converted to the net position classifications required under GASB 34. The adjustments shown on the statement of net position accomplish that task.

### **NOTE 10 – OTHER EMPLOYMENT AND POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

#### HEALTHCARE

##### Plan Description

The Commissioners of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1, County of Hunterdon and State of New Jersey contributes to the State Health Benefits Program (SHBP), a healthcare plan administered by the State of New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits. SHBP was established in 1961 under N.J.S.A. 52:14-17.25 et seq., to provide health benefits to State employees, retirees, and their dependents. The SHBP was extended to employees, retirees, and dependents of participating local public employers in 1964. Local employers must adopt a resolution to participate in the SHBP. Rules governing the operation and administration of the program are found in Title 17, Chapter 9 of the New Jersey Administrative Code. SHBP provides medical, prescription drugs, mental health/substance abuse, and Medicare Part B reimbursement to retirees and their covered dependents.

The State Health Benefits Commission is the executive body established by statute to be responsible for the operation of the SHBP. The State of New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the SHBP. That report may be obtained by writing to: State of New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits, P.O. Box 295, Trenton, NJ 08625-0295 or by visiting their website at [www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions](http://www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions).

##### Funding Policy

Participating employers are contractually required to contribute based on the amount of premiums attributable to their active employees and retirees.

Contributions to pay for the health premiums of participating active employees and retirees in the SHBP are billed to the Commissioners of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey on a monthly basis. The Fire District funds the cost of these benefits through taxes. The cost of health benefits per active employee and retiree is determined by the SHBP. In 2014, there were two active employees and no retirees receiving benefits.

As of July 2011, under Chapter 78, P.L. 2001, employee contributions for health benefits are required at a specified percentage of the health benefits/prescription drug premiums for a salary range, but not less than 1.5% of salary (as previously required under Chapter 2, P.L. 2010). For local government employees the first year phase in began upon the expiration of the collective negotiations agreement in effect as of June 28, 2011. For new employees hired on or after June 28, 2011, or after the expiration of a collective negotiations agreement that was in force on June 28, 2011, the employees contribute (without any phase-in) at the full amount of the required contribution rate (4.5% to 35%). The amount the employees contributed for the year ended December 31, 2014 was \$1,955.

The City of Lambertville Fire District No.1, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey contribution to SHBP for the year ending December 31, 2014 was \$31,126, of which \$0 was for retirees, which equaled the required contributions for the year.

**NOTE 11 – RISK MANAGEMENT**

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to limited torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the District carries commercial insurance.

**NOTE 12 – LITIGATION**

As of the date of this report there is no litigation pending which, if decided adversely to the District would have a material impact on the District.

**NOTE 13 – DATE OF MANAGEMENT’S REVIEW**

Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 30, 2015, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events were identified that required adjustment to or disclosure within the financial statements.

**NOTE 1 – BUDGETS/BUDGETARY CONTROL**

Annual budgets are prepared each year for the operations of the fire district. The budgets are approved by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. The budgets are then voted upon by the public, at the annual fire district election held on the third Saturday in February. Budgetary transfers may be made during the last two months of the year.

Formal budgetary integration into the accounting system is employed as a management control device during the year. For governmental funds there are no substantial differences between the budgetary basis of accounting and generally accepted accounting principles. Encumbrance accounting is also employed as an extension of formal budgetary integration in the governmental fund types. Unencumbered appropriations lapse at fiscal year end.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities of City of Lambertville Fire District No.1 as of and for the year ended December 31, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated September 30, 2015.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the City of Lambertville Fire District No.1's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters
